For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include James Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner, murdered by members of the Ku Klux Klan in Neshoba County, Mississippi on 21 June 1964. The three young men were registering African Americans to vote as part of the Freedom Summer campaign. Chaney was from Meridian, MS, and Goodman and Schwerner were from New York City. In 2014, they were posthumously awarded the Medal of Freedom by President Barack Obama. May their memories be a blessing to all who love freedom.




HEATHER BOOTH

Ushpizin are exalted guests invited into the sukkah during Sukkot. Each guest's life teaches a unique lesson expressing the spirit of the day. For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include Heather Booth, who has been a civil rights activist, feminist, and political strategist since her student days, joining the Congress of Racial Equality while still in high school, and traveling south to take part in Freedom Summer, registering African American voters in Mississippi. She organized some of the earliest consciousness-raising groups of the sixties women's movement, cofounding the Chicago Women's Liberation Collective in 1969. She organized the Jane Collective, making safe abortions available to women until the Supreme Court's 1973 ruling in Roe v. Wade effectively legalized abortion. In 1973, she founded the Midwest Academy to train community organizers. She has worked on many progressive electoral campaigns and Get Out The Vote projects, and done groundbreaking work on financial reform. In 2016, a documentary film by Lilly Rivlin was released: Heather Booth: Changing the World. Her tireless work for a just and loving society is an inspiration to millions. Long may she flourish!

For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include Charles McDew, Fannie Lou Hamer, and Bob Moses. McDew was 1960-63 chair of the Student NonViolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and, according to Moses, "black by birth, a Jew by choice and a revolutionary by necessity." Hamer was cofounder of the Freedom Democratic Party and a lead organizer of Freedom Summer along with SNCC. Moses led SNCC's Mississippi Project and later founded The Algebra Project, winning a MacArthur "Genius Award." May their lives inspire all who love freedom.

DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

Ushpizin are exalted guests invited into the sukkah during Sukkot. Each guest's life teaches a unique lesson expressing the spirit of the day. For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Their lives differed greatly—Heschel was born in Warsaw in 1907, King in Atlanta in 1929—yet the impact of their work for social justice bridged that gap, inspiring the world. These friends and allies often spoke of each other as prophets. You may have seen R. Heschel quoted as saying that when he marched with Dr. King in Selma, Alabama, "I felt my legs were praying." He characterized the struggle for civil rights as "the test of our integrity, a magnificent spiritual opportunity." But did you know that Dr. King was invited to attend his first Passover seder at R. Heschel's home in April, 1968? He was murdered less than two weeks before Passover began. In this 1965 photo, R. Heschel is presenting the Judaism and World Peace award to Dr. King. May their memories be a blessing for all who love justice.

For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include Roy Wilkins, a longtime NAACP leader; A. Philip Randolph, founder of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters; and Arnold Aronson (far right above), program director of the National Jewish Community Relations Advisory Council. Together they founded the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, which worked to shape the legal structure of the Voting Rights Act. They played essential leadership roles in planning the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Justice; they are depicted above marching together on that day. May their lives inspire all who love freedom.




RUTH BADER GINSBURG

Ushpizin are exalted guests invited into the sukkah during Sukkot. Each guest's life teaches a unique lesson expressing the spirit of the day. For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg. Among many such accomplishments, she wrote the dissenting opinion in the 2013 Supreme Court case Shelby County vs. Holder, opposing the decision that eviscerated the Voting Rights Act of 1965. She attributed the decrease in discrimination in voting in the covered jurisdictions to the Act itself, which required federal "preclearance" of local voting laws to ensure that states or districts were not violating the law by denying voting rights. The majority said that preclearance was no longer needed. Justice Ginsburg pointed out that "Throwing out preclearance when it has worked and is continuing to work to stop discriminatory changes is like throwing away your umbrella in a rainstorm because you are not getting wet." A 2018 film, RBG, documents this and many other actions she took to make democracy real. Her tireless work for a just and loving society is an inspiration to millions. Long may she flourish!

SCHWIMMER



Ushpizin are exalted guests invited into the sukkah during Sukkot. Each guest's life teaches a unique lesson expressing the spirit of the day. For Share Sukkot: Grow The Vote, our honored guests include Ida B. Wells and Rosika Schwimmer. Wells, greatlyrespected as a journalist, organizer, and cofounder of the NAACP, was born in 1862 in Mississippi. She cofounded the first organization—the Alpha Suffrage Club—to give African American women a voice in the segregated women's suffrage movement. Shwimmer, a pacifist activist born in Hungary in 1877, started women's rights organizations there, including the Hungarian Feminist Association, winning women's suffrage in 1920. She served as press secretary of the International Woman Suffrage Alliance. May their lives inspire all who love freedom!
